



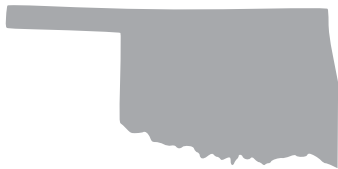

#1 IN THE WORLD

Oklahoma has the highest rate of incarceration leaving 1 in 7 children with a parent in prison at some point in their childhood.



Children with a history of parental incarceration have a significantly higher risk of going to prison themselves.

ADVERSE CHILDHOOD EXPERIENCES (ACEs)

- PHYSICAL, EMOTIONAL OR SEXUAL ABUSE
- PARENTAL INCARCERATION
- NEGLECT
- PARENTAL MENTAL ILLNESS
- SUBSTANCE ABUSE
- PARENTAL SEPARATION OR DIVORCE
- DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

Trauma can disrupt brain development causing social, emotional, and cognitive problems throughout an individual's life, which increase the likelihood of risky health behaviors, chronic health conditions, difficulty functioning at school/work, and even early death.

28.5% of Oklahoma kids experience two or more of these before the age of 18

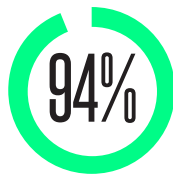
The single most important factor for a child to develop resiliency is having at least one stable and committed relationship with a supportive adult.

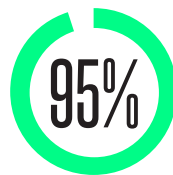

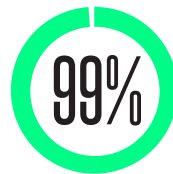
